

### United Way Emerald Coast WOMEN UNITED

This year, UWEC launched Women United - a donor network made up of our community's most generous ladies who contribute an annual unrestricted gift of \$500 or more. We celebrated over brunch alongside 120 passionate

ladies, who voted for "Mental Health of Women and Girls" as Women United's first focus area. Following the launch, Women United's first event was a panel with 25 attendees sharing their stories, experience and expertise in a community conversation centered around breaking down stigmas and stereotypes of mental health. For the next two years, this group will continue to find new and innovative ways to make an impact on the mental health of women and girls, before reassessing their focus area.





This year, Emerging Leaders - a donor network for young professionals who contribute an annual unrestricted gift of \$120 or more - hosted its inaugural 40 Under 40 awards, recognizing 40 of the most outstanding young professionals in Okaloosa and Walton counties. Emerging Leaders continued to engage young professionals through professional development opportunities like Lunch With a Leader featuring Okaloosa County Commissioner Mel Ponder and Emerald Coast Harley Davidson's Gus Gusoff, and service opportunities including Warm Hearts Full Tummies meal kit assembly and the installation of Okaloosa County's first Born Learning Trail.
